




Figure 3.4 Out of Pocket Expenditure on Health

## **Community Voices**

Sex Workers have been left out of the development narrative for lack of concrete data documenting our access and needs to basic services. This was the first time our community was exposed to SDGs and discovered various rights that we deserve as human beings. This project has shown with proof that basic needs and rights of Sex Workers need just as much tending to as other vulnerable people.

The use of mobile app for survey was an innovative design which helped the data collectors immensely and the real-time monitoring also helped create genuine data for the community. The participatory approach of the study has helped localise SDGs which we will further use for advocacy push. This is the first time someone has studied our community and given us data that we can use to talk to local authorities. We are deprived of a lot of benefits, but we didn't even know about our legal entitlements. We aim to make more people aware about these rights, and SDGs and advocate for effective implementation so that these benefits start reaching our people.
